

The Annual Fund

Letter from the Principal.

We finished 2003 with the concluding celebrations of our 50th anniversary, described in the last Newsletter.

In 2004 we are continuing to move forward on the three themes we identified for special attention as a way of marking our 50th anniversary (or golden jubilee), and setting an agenda for the coming few years.

Work continues on the **development of an architectural masterplan** for our central Banbury Road premises. This looks at our current and future needs, and how we meet them, by using and developing existing buildings, and by construction of new purpose-built buildings. The plans taking shape are exciting and we look forward to sharing these with everyone, when they are developed.

We continue to develop our understanding and practice of **global citizenship.** This year we have focused on fair trade and on recycling of materials within the College. There is still much to do. Keith Allen, the Vice-Principal has recently taken on a coordinating role for this project.

Our third golden jubilee theme is **to establish scholarships and bursaries on a more secure financial basis**. The first way we are addressing this is as part of our new Annual Fund, announced initially in Oxford Town Hall in November last year, and which we are now launching.

Our Governors and the Development Committee, under the leadership of its Chairman, General Sir Sam Cowan (introduced on page 4), have decided that an Annual Fund is necessary in order to meet more fully the needs of our current and future students. The Annual Fund aims to raise funds on a regular basis, year on year, to put towards our most pressing needs which cannot be funded fully and directly from fee income.

Further details about the Annual Fund are in the special brochure, enclosed with this Newsletter for many of you. It comes with the Annual Fund form, which explains the various ways of making donations and how to do so tax effectively, where possible.

If you would like to find out more about the fund then please contact Kay Honner in the Development and Alumni Office.

This year our targets for the Annual Fund include the installation of a wireless internet system for all our buildings, funding for scholarships, and the establishment of a hardship fund.

Within this Newsletter you will also find information on the establishment of the **St Clare's Association**. This embraces all who have been associated with St Clare's, in whatever capacity – as past students, parents and former staff. The Association will hold an Annual Reunion weekend, provide career and higher education support, and run events both in the UK and elsewhere. We hope it will become a valuable addition to the St Clare's scene.

After our 50 year celebrations, we are now looking at how we can best move forward into the next fifty years with our new mission: **advancing international education and understanding**. In connection with this we are working on our strategic planning for both the short and longer term.

Over the past year, we had the great pleasure of meeting many alumni and friends. We look forward to speaking with you over the coming months and years as we develop our thinking and focus for the future of St Clare's.

I hope to see many members of the St Clare's Association during the coming year and look forward to meeting as many as possible at our Annual Reunion.

Introducing ...

General Sir Sam Cowan KCB CBE

Chairman of the Development Committee



Sam Cowan's willingness to chair (and cheer!) the St Clare's development programme is a tremendous piece of good fortune for the College. His charisma, his global human sympathies and his insistence on a collectively agreed strategic vision took him to the very top echelon of Britain's Armed Services as Head of Combined Logistics. These same qualities are now going to benefit St Clare's, keeping all of us – governors, management and staff – on our toes and alert to the importance for the College's future of alumni relations and external support.

Q. How long have you lived in Oxford?

We bought a house here nearly 23 years ago which belonged to Anne Dreydel and her mother. So that is a very strong St Clare's connection! We lived in it on and off until my retirement from the Army eighteen months ago and are now in permanent residence.

Q. What were the highlights of your Army career?

Too many to mention! I will certainly remember the uphill finish of my last four years as Chief of Defence Logistics charged with bringing the three single service logistic organisations into one defence structure - Army, Navy and Airforce. Big change like that puts a heavy premium and strain on strong leadership. Equally memorable in terms of stress were my two years as the British Army's Director of Public Relations when I was a Brigadier. Every day brought unexpected, unplanned and often unwelcome challenges!

Q. What are your connections with Nepal?

We have 3400 Gurkhas - Nepalese citizens - serving in the British Army, a tradition which goes back 190 years. As a young officer I served for three years with the Queen's Gurkha Signals and for my last nine years of service I was Colonel Commandant of the Brigade of Gurkhas and Chairman of the Gurkha Welfare Trust. I first visited Nepal in 1966 and have spent over 250 days of my life over about 15 visits trekking the hill regions of the country.

Q. What is the appeal? Why do you keep going back?

It is difficult to give a short answer but I think "pilgrimage" instead of "trekking" with all that that means about the experience of the journey and getting away from the pressures of everyday life. Think also of the great value of understanding another culture on its own terms rather than, as we so often tend to do, adopting a judgmental approach based simply on our own values and experience. Think also of the mystery and uniquely awe-inspiring great Himalaya. That should give you the general idea!

Q. If you were an American you might be running for President or in some other countries you might be plotting a coup. Why are you helping St Clare's?

The Chairman of the Governors is a very persuasive man but the real reason is my last answer. By living and working together prejudices and barriers based on culture and nationality break down quickly and we need a lot more of that in the world today. As I understand it, this simple fact is the basis of the St Clare's ethos, and I am delighted to help such a good cause in whatever way I can.

A Window on Short Courses

Short courses at St. Clare's may well be unknown territory to many of our readers, but have been well established within the College for many years. We encompass a wide range of courses throughout the academic year such as self-contained English language courses, teacher training for non-native teachers of English, Language through Learning[™] for academic subject teachers teaching non-native students through the medium of the English language, university-level study abroad groups as well as summer programmes for young adults and children.

We welcome over 50 nationalities and upwards of 1000 students each year onto these programmes – some return for subsequent courses and others go on to more long-term study with us. All in all, many feet pass through our doors in this way!

The summer 2004 season is fast approaching and consists of three main areas of focus:

- Junior residential 'English plus activity' courses for international children aged 10-12 and 13-16 years
- Young adult English language programmes for international students aged 16 plus
- International Baccalaureate Summer Institute for UK/international students either about to start their IB programme, or mid-way through their studies

A summer course at St. Clare's offers young students so much more than academic gain. For many it may be their first time away from home. Being immersed in a new situation, living and learning with other students from different backgrounds and cultures affords opportunities in terms of social skills. Making friends and gaining new independence and confidence away from their home life can and does enrich their young experience.

All of the summer programmes integrate academic learning with activities and trips that are suitable to each age group and enable the students to make the most of their stay. Our aim is to give all of our students, however short their stay with us, a real 'happy life experience' that they can take away with them and build on in the future.

Scholarships, Bursaries and Financial Assistance at St Clare's

St. Clare's offers scholarships and bursaries on a limited basis, on most courses. In all cases, scholarships and bursaries are awarded before entry to the College, and are based on academic record, likely contribution to the College community, and financial circumstances. Unlike some schools and colleges which award scholarships purely on merit, at St. Clare's financial awards always take into account financial background. Awards are intended to enable good students to attend St. Clare's, who could not otherwise come.

The best established and most extensive award programme is for entry to the International Baccalaureate Diploma course. Awards are made on the basis of competition, and the Scholarship Day in February attracts applicants from all over the world. Awards include the Anne Dreydel Foundation scholarships, funded by the independent charity, the Anne Dreydel Foundation, established by the co-founder of the College.

The Marie-Noelle Kelly scholarship, named after a distinguished former Governor, is awarded to a student to study English language during the academic year. A recently established scholarship programme on the Liberal Arts programme enables students from US universities to take some classes at a permanent private hall in the University of Oxford, to complement the programme taught within St. Clare's. A limited number of scholarships are also awarded for students and teachers on our summer IB Institute – short courses and workshops for IB students and teachers from all over the world.

We do not have an endowment to cover our scholarships and bursaries, although we have a recently established, and still rather modest scholarship fund.

The general academic standing of the College, and the life of the student community is strengthened by scholarship and bursary awards.

In addition to scholarships and bursaries awarded prior to entry, the College makes limited provision to assist current students, in exceptional circumstances, whose financial situations have unexpectedly changed.

St. Clare's would very much like to extend the scholarship and bursary programme, to enable more students to benefit form the education we provide.

"Before coming to St Clare's I went to my local comprehensive school in Highworth near Swindon. I had to leave when I was 16 and go to another school, so during my final year I started to look at my options. From a purely academic perspective, they attract intelligent students who were never able to consider private education because of the financial costs involved. This adds to the all-round diversity that is unique here, which in turn broadens everyone's perspectives on the world and its inhabitants.I am extremely grateful to have the opportunity, to study in this amazing place."

"While browsing through the various prospectuses of different schools in the UK late 2002, St Clare's stood out with its vibrant international community and range of study and social opportunities in the heart of the UK's educational hub. Having been in an international school following the British curriculum in Saudi Arabia, a 'global community' was very important to me. However, what really pushed me to apply was the fact that St Clare's is one of very few schools which offer the prospect of a scholarship to study the International Baccalaureate not only based on academic achievement, but also by the need of financial aid.

What really impressed me about St Clare's financial aid programme was that bursaries were awarded to those who wanted to acquire a better education but didn't quite succeed in the scholarship assessments. This shows how open minded and understanding of a broader, more realistic education (both academic and social) St Clare's really is."

⁶⁶For me, it was the unique and diverse mixture of people that made St Clare's such a special place in which to live and study for two years. St Clare's provided me with an excellent education, both inside and outside of the classroom. The majority of IB students at St Clare's have a very international background, I, by contrast, grew up in England, speaking English, with English parents and friends and attending English schools. I still am envious of those students who were bilingual, or even trilingual, and had, at a young age, visited many countries. But I am incredibly grateful to have had the opportunity to meet them and to learn, through them, so much about the world. In return, I was able to show the overseas students around Oxford and to introduce them to my own culture. This opportunity was provided by the St Clare's scholarship scheme which enables students, such as myself, who would otherwise be unable to attend the College to benefit from a broad education and a stimulating international environment.

The friends that I made and the countries that I learnt about while at St Clare's fuelled my desire to travel and after graduating from St Clare's I took a 'Gap Year' before starting university and went to South America for six months. During this time I learnt Spanish, worked for three months on a conservation project in the Andes and travelled in Ecuador, Peru and Bolivia.

On my return to England I settled down in Cambridge for three years in order to study for a degree in Natural Sciences. However, after a year of science, science, maths and more science, I began to miss the arts. In my second year I chose to take a course on the History and Philosophy of Science, and in my third year I converted to this course full-time. Thus I found myself specialising in a subject very similar to the Theory of Knowledge (TOK) component of the IB. Several years before, sitting in a TOK lesson debating the merits of Karl Popper's philosophy of science or Descartes' meditations, I would never have guessed that I would return to those same discussions as a university student.

As I write, I am sitting on my tatami mat floor, legs outstretched under the *kotatsu* (heated table), in a small apartment in a volcanic crater on the island of Kyushu, Japan. It is a truly beautiful place. I wonder how I ended up living here, teaching English at the local High School. When I applied for this job with the Japan Exchange Teaching (JET) Programme I recall thinking how similar the Programme's aims were to St Clare's philosophy of international education and understanding. But while St Clare's is a truly international community housing students from countries all over the world, Japan, on the other hand, is ethnically very homogeneous, especially outside of the more cosmopolitan cities such as Tokyo and Osaka. I am one of a very small number of foreign nationals living in my area. This makes my job of promoting international understanding challenging, but all the more important.[?]

⁶⁶ I remember my two years studying the IB at St Clare's with fondness - they helped to shape who I am today and provided me with a fantastic education to spring board into adult life.

My broad-based and rounded education will always be an asset to me, and I am often grateful for it. Even having to study a foreign language has proved invaluable, as I am not a natural linguist. I have found myself continuing to learn Spanish at evening class in order to gain more out of my trips to Spanish-speaking countries. I even found myself taking extra Spanish lessons in Banos, Ecuador last year to improve my grammar!

The transition from the close knit community at St Clare's to university was a tough one. However, the experiences of St Clare's – living away from home, meeting people from other countries and cultures, the more relaxed teaching styles and the more independent living served me well and I soon made the adjustment from a St Clare's student to a university student. I completed my MSc in Pharmacy at Bath University in 2001.

Having spent the best part of eight months globe trotting last year, I find the list of places I would like to visit is getting longer, not shorter. The more I see, smell, listen to and experience, the more I would like to do. Perhaps my confidence in travelling and meeting new people can be attributed to the multi-cultural society at St Clare's. There is so much out there to experience, I feel a lifetime really is not sufficient! But for now I will, continue to practice as a pharmacist and dream about the next trip – or perhaps the new house!⁹

In December 2003 the Development and Alumni Office activated a new web-enabled network to unite and benefit our alumni and friends: St Clare's Online. So far over 10% of our alumni with whom we are in touch have registered, updating their information, posting news items and searching for colleagues lost over the years. Others, with whom we had lost touch, have also registered. This major new resource allows people to keep in touch with eachother and with what is happening at St Clare's. All registered members receive a monthly e-newsletter keeping them up to date with news and events.

Below are some hints to allow you to access data simply and accurately. If you have not yet registered please do so - just go to the St Clare's website, click on Alumni, and then on Alumni Online. In order to register click on "New, never registered before?" and answer the questions which come up as best you can - this points the database to your correct record so we can identify who you are.

We look forward to communicating with alumni and friends in this electronic and immediate way.

Searching for your friends at St Clare's Online...

Simplify the Search as much as you can. Instead of entering the full name, just search for the forename, the first letter of the family name and their leaving year and see if your friend shows up in the list of members. If there is a possibility that the member has changed their family name, then use the *Search on Previous Family Name* click box.

If you find who you are looking for but there are no contact details for them, contact the Development and Alumni Office who will be able to add them onto the News Item 'Looking for Lost Friends'.

If you still can't find who you are looking for it could be because the member has chosen not to display his or her information or we do not have them on our system. If you suspect this is the case, contact the Development and Alumni Office and ask them to approach the person you are looking for.

Higher Education Advice and Careers Network...

One of the most important decisions our students have to make is their choice of Higher Education. We are keen to put students in touch with alumni who have been to the same university or college that they are thinking about attending so that they can get a real picture of what life is like at a particular institution before taking the decision to go there. If you would like to give advice about your university, please ensure that all your details are correct on the *Higher Education* screen so that our students can find the information easily.

The Careers Network will enable current and former students to access the wealth of information our alumni have. If you would like to be involved as part of the Careers Network, you add your current details on the *Occupations* screen so that other members can search for you.

Once in the *Occupations* screen, you need to click on *Edit* at the top right hand side of the screen. You will then be asked to select from the following options;

■ Advice:

We would like to take advantage of your professional experience. If you are willing to give advice to either a current student or another member, please tick this box.

■ Speaker:

Sometimes at St Clare's, for example at Careers and Higher Education Day, we are looking for members who are willing to speak about their career and life achievements. If you are willing to be a speaker, please tick this box, then we can get in touch if we have an appropriate opportunity.

■ Are you willing to speak directly to members?

You can choose to make yourself available directly to members or to only be available through the Development and Alumni Office. If you tick this box, then the members will be able to find you on the *Find Other Members* search.

Remember the 'Help' buttons, which are on every screen. If you can't find what you are looking for, check the instructions in 'Help'. If you are still having problems, contact the Development and Alumni Office. alumni@stclares.ac.uk

Update on STEP

St Clare's Tanzanian Education Project

STEP was established at St Clare's after Phillipe Durant, a French teacher at the College, established a link between St Clare's and a primary school in Moshi, Tanzania. The aim was to raise money to help the Kiboriloni school to renovate the badly delapidated buildings. Each year, a new group of students takes charge of the STEP project and they organise events to raise money.

Extracts from a letter from Wilbald Swai, Headteacher, Kiboriloni Primary School.

"The pupils are now enjoying a more comfortable atmosphere you've created for them. We recived £1800 from you and we have now finished the veranda of the unfinished buildings as you can see in the picture. The veranda was 54 metres long, 3 metres wide. We used a total of 56 iron sheets, 19 iron poles. The children are now happy as when it rains they can move comfortably.

Our next target it to build a kitchen. You can see the photo of the old kitchen. The estimate for this is 6,000,000 Tanzanian Shillings which is equivalent to £3800. The parents are busy constructing new classrooms to enable us to reduce the number of pupils from 65 to 45 per class. The Government is also assisting them in this. So the work load is being shared."



We have had an excellent response to our proposed open studio exhibition for the Oxfordshire Artweeks Festival. The exhibition, entitled *Developing Vision*, will open between 10am and 5pm from 15 - 23 May and promises photographic work of a high standard ranging from documentary-style work to fine art and experimental pieces.

On the documentary side of photography we will have work from Jenny Waddell (IB 1982) who is submitting photographs taken in Kenya. We will also have work from Jasmine Waddell (no relation of Jenny), a post-graduate student at St Anthony's College, Oxford, who is currently Warden of one of the IB houses at St Clare's. Her black and white photographs document the lives of teachers and students in Ilitha Junior Secondary School in Mount Frere, Eastern Cape, who walk miles every day from one-room shacks and child-headed households to school and a vision of a new South Africa.
